### Tax Credit

It's not too late to bring in those last minute tax credits dated December 31, 2010

This year, House Bill 2001 allowed the state to make additional cuts to schools. Over the winter break, Mountain Oak School was informed the cut to Mountain Oak would be \$10,700.

To continue offering specialty classes at the current level, the school needs more tax credits. This year, the community has brought in \$12,000. The budgeted amount was \$19,000. With the additional cut from the state, however, the more tax credits parents contribute, the less cuts MOS will have to make to our programs.
